Overall Performance^{1 2}

- Thus far, 25 destinations reported international arrival data for 2025, 12 of which saw growth, while 12 destinations recorded a decline compared to the same period in 2024.
- Seven destinations reported international tourist visits for the period January to December, five of which registered growth. Growth rates ranged from 3.0% in Anguilla to 22.1% in Guyana. Conversely, the British Virgin Islands and Jamaica recorded declines of -0.9% and -13.4%, respectively, for the timeframe. Compared to their 2019 results for the same period, tourist visits rose in five of these destinations by between 0.1% (the British Virgin Islands) and 68.8% (Curaçao) but contracted by -4.7% in Trinidad and Tobago and by -6.3% in Jamaica.
- Dominica led the four destinations that reported gains in international arrivals for the January to November period, recording a 16.5% increase. This performance was followed by a 6.0% rise in Aruba, while modest gains of 2.5% and 0.5% were registered by the Cayman Islands and Belize, respectively. The other seven destinations to report international arrivals for the noted period experienced declines ranging from -0.4% (Antigua & Barbuda) to -18.7% (Cuba). Additionally, seven destinations surpassed their 2019 tourist arrival numbers, with increases varying from 0.9% in Martinique to 34.6% in Aruba. However, The Bahamas, the Cayman Islands, Bermuda, and Cuba trailed their 2019 figures for this period by -1.1%, -11.8%, -26.3%, and -58.2%, respectively.
- For the period January to October, growth in tourist arrivals was recorded in half of the four reporting destinations, where increases were 19.8% in St. Vincent & the Grenadines and 5.3% in Barbados. Meanwhile, for the same timeframe, the other two destinations experienced declines in arrivals: -1.2% in the Turks & Caicos Islands and -1.4% in the US Virgin Islands. Compared to the same months in 2019, all four destinations saw growth in international arrivals, as increases ranged from 2.3% in Barbados to 42.0% in the US Virgin Islands.
- Three destinations reported arrival data for the period January to June. Puerto Rico registered a 6.5% increase, while Montserrat recorded a -13.1% decrease. Puerto Rico also surpassed its pre-pandemic level by 28.9%. Meanwhile, Montserrat trailed its 2019 level by -25.1%.

Month

- In January, international visitor trips increased in 17 of the 25 reporting destinations, with gains ranging from 0.9% in Trinidad & Tobago to 22.8% in Guyana. Seven other reporting destinations experienced declines, varying between -1.8% in Saint Lucia and -24.6% in Cuba. Twenty-one destinations also registered growth compared to the same month in 2019, while the remaining three recorded declines. Curaçao (66.0%) led growth rates, followed by Anguilla (43.9%), the US Virgin Islands (36.6%), Guyana (35.5%), St. Vincent & the Grenadines (34.7%), and Aruba (32.4%). Meanwhile, Trinidad & Tobago (-3.4%), Bermuda (-24.4%), and Cuba (-59.9%) were the destinations to register a falloff in arrivals.
- Fifteen of the 25 reporting destinations noted an increase in stopover arrivals in February. Trinidad & Tobago (18.5%) had the highest percentage growth this month, followed by Guyana (16.8%), Curaçao (15.6%), Dominica (14.9%), and St. Vincent & the Grenadines (10.0%). Decreases were recorded in nine destinations during this month, ranging from -1.7% in Martinique to -33.5% in Cuba. Compared to 2019, 16 destinations experienced growth with rates varying from 3.3% in Grenada to 69.2% in

Curaçao. Trinidad & Tobago's arrivals showed no change, while seven other destinations lagged their pre-pandemic performances by between -0.3% (Saint Lucia) and -61.1% (Cuba).

- Growth in stay-over arrivals continued in March for 13 of the 25 destinations, while the other 11 destinations recorded declines in visits this month. The destinations that saw increased visitor arrivals grew between 0.2% in Antigua & Barbuda and 14.0% in Curaçao. In contrast, the smallest decrease was recorded by the Dominican Republic (-2.0%), whereas Cuba noted the largest percentage decrease in tourist arrivals at -29.7%. Fourteen of the reporting destinations exceeded their pre-pandemic arrival levels for March, with growth ranging from 7.0% (Anguilla) to 73.1% (Curaçao). Saint Lucia's arrivals remained relatively consistent. In the remaining destinations, however, arrivals trailed by between -1.0% (Jamaica) and -62.0% (Cuba).
- International tourist arrivals recorded for April increased in 19 of the 25 reporting destinations by between 0.4% (Antigua & Barbuda) and 32.9% (in both St. Vincent & the Grenadines and Trinidad & Tobago). Declines of -0.1%, -3.9%, -4.6%, -5.9%, and -21.3% were recorded in Saint Lucia, the US Virgin Islands, Grenada, Montserrat, and Cuba, respectively; the other destinations reporting arrivals for this month. While the US Virgin Islands (87.8%), Curaçao (69.3%), Guyana (40.5%), St. Vincent & the Grenadines (37.8%), Aruba (34.6%), Puerto Rico (33.9%), the Turks & Caicos Islands (32.1%), and the Dominican Republic (28.2%) saw the most robust growth compared to the same time in 2019, ten other destinations also noted gains ranging from 0.7% in The Bahamas to 19.1% in Grenada. The six remaining destinations recorded shortfalls of between -1.1% (Dominica) and -63.3% (Cuba).
- Twenty-five destinations reported international visitor arrivals for May. Six of these destinations observed growth ranging from 0.6% in Barbados to 17.6% in Guyana. Eighteen of the residual destinations saw declines, with decreases ranging from -0.4% in both Antigua & Barbuda and Dominica to -19.4% in Cuba. Sixteen destinations also registered growth compared to the same month in 2019, while declines were recorded in the remaining eight destinations. The increases ranged from 3.1% in Saint Lucia to 62.1% in Curaçao, while the decreases ranged from -1.1% (The Bahamas) to -66.2% (Cuba).
- Increased tourist visits were observed in 13 of the 25 destinations reporting for June, led by double-digit growth of 15.2%, 14.5%, and 11.1% in Guyana, Curaçao, and St. Vincent & the Grenadines, respectively. The other ten with gains saw more modest increases, ranging from 0.7% to 7.1%. The 11 destinations that experienced fewer tourist visits noted decreases ranging from -2.8% in Barbados and -12.4% in Saint Lucia. Similarly, 13 destinations experienced increases between 1.7% (Belize) and 69.2% (Curaçao), compared to the pre-pandemic levels for the corresponding period. The other 11 destinations recorded shortfalls of between -0.9% (The Bahamas) and -56.5% (Cuba).
- Of the 22 destinations reporting tourist arrivals for July, 15 showed increases ranging from 0.4% (the Turks & Caicos Islands) to 36.8% (St. Vincent & the Grenadines). The seven remaining destinations experienced declines between -0.4% in Antigua & Barbuda and -8.0% in Martinique. Matched against the 2019 numbers, increases of between 5.0% (Belize) and 79.8% (Curaçao) were registered by 13 destinations. Conversely, the British Virgin Islands experienced the smallest percentage decrease (-2.0%), while the largest was observed in Cuba (-51.8%) among the nine remaining destinations.
- For August, 22 destinations reported international tourist arrivals. Twelve destinations recorded growth ranging from 0.8% (Belize) to 43.9% (Guyana). Meanwhile, ten destinations recorded contractions, led by the Cayman Islands (-10.6%) and followed by the British Virgin Islands (-8.1%) and The Bahamas (-7.5%). Compared to August 2019, increases were observed in 13 destinations led by Guyana (68.3%), followed by Curaçao (55.9%), St. Vincent & the Grenadines (45.6%), the Dominican

Republic (42.2%), and Aruba (38.1%). In contrast, tourist arrival levels in the remaining nine destinations were below their 2019 level by between -0.4% (Trinidad & Tobago) and -49.5% (Cuba).

- International visitor trips recorded for September increased in nine out of the 22 reporting destinations by between 2.6% in Aruba and 36.9% in Guyana. The 13 remaining destinations recorded shortfalls of between -0.1% (Martinique) and -15.2% (the British Virgin Islands). Thirteen destinations also saw growth compared to September 2019, with increases ranging from 4.8% (Martinique) to 72.5% (Guyana). On the other hand, tourist arrivals decreased in nine other destinations with drops ranging from -2.7% (The Bahamas) to -47.0% (Cuba).
- There was growth in international tourist visits in half of the 22 destinations reporting data for October. Arrivals to Dominica, Guyana, Trinidad & Tobago, Curaçao, and St. Vincent & the Grenadines were 31.6%, 28.9%, 17.3%, 14.6%, and 13.2% more, respectively, than those received in the same month of 2024. In the other six destinations with growth, the increases ranged from 1.6% in Grenada to 7.0% in the Dominican Republic. However, six destinations experienced a decline in arrivals this month, with decreases ranging from -0.3% in Antigua & Barbuda to -21.3% in Jamaica. Compared to October 2019, tourist visits increased in 15 destinations, with growth ranging from 0.8% in Antigua & Barbuda to 76.7% in Curaçao. Meanwhile, destinations that recorded declines over the same period saw decreases ranging from -0.8% in Trinidad & Tobago to -52.8% in Cuba.
- In November, growth ranging between 1.8% (Belize) and 21.7% (Dominica) was recorded in 11 of the 18 reporting destinations. In contrast, the other seven destinations posted declines between -0.3% (The Bahamas) and -68.0% (Jamaica). While Curaçao (71.3%), the Dominican Republic (55.0%), and Aruba (37.6%) led growth rates among the 12 destinations with increases over the same month in 2019, the remaining destinations recorded shortfalls of between -3.4% (the Cayman Islands) and -65.4% (Jamaica).
- Five of the seven destinations reporting December data recorded growth in international tourist visits. Guyana saw an increase of 21.3%, followed by the Dominican Republic (10.5%), Curaçao (9.8%), Anguilla (9.6%) and Trinidad & Tobago (1.6%), compared to the same month in 2024. The British Virgin Islands (-4.6%) and Jamaica (-63.6%) were the destinations recording declines in arrivals during this month. However, Curaçao (81.6%), the Dominican Republic (56.5%), Anguilla (46.7%), and Guyana (45.6%) received more tourists than in December 2019, while Trinidad & Tobago (-0.8%), the British Virgin Islands (-2.3%) and Jamaica (-60.8%) saw decreases in arrivals.

By Market

United States

- Visitor arrivals from the United States in 2025 increased in 10 out of the 20 reporting destinations, while the remaining nine destinations experienced a contraction.
- Of the six destinations reporting arrivals from the United States for the period January to December, Curaçao (17.4%), Trinidad & Tobago (9.1%), Guyana (8.7%), and Anguilla (3.6%) recorded increases, while the Dominican Republic (-2.1%) and Jamaica (-13.8%) registered declines. Nevertheless, five destinations reported growth from this market compared with the same period in 2019, with increases ranging from 0.7% in Trinidad & Tobago to 182.6% in Curaçao.
- Visitor trips from the United States rose in four of the ten destinations reporting arrival data from January to November. Growth was led by Saint Lucia (3.9%), followed by Antigua & Barbuda (2.9%), the Cayman Islands (2.4%), and Aruba (2.1%). However, six other destinations saw decreases in US visitor arrivals that varied between -1.3% (Belize) and -47.9% (Dominica) during this time. Compared to the same period in 2019, six destinations recorded growth ranging from 1.7% in The Bahamas to 45.6% in Antigua & Barbuda. The remaining four destinations experienced declines: the Cayman Islands (-13.0%), Dominica (-27.9%), Bermuda (-28.7%), and Cuba (-78.4%).
- International trips from the United States increased in both destinations reporting for the period January to October, increasing by 46.3% in St. Vincent & the Grenadines and by 11.1% in Barbados. Compared with pre-crisis levels, US arrivals in the period exceeded the corresponding 2019 figures by 103.6% in St. Vincent & the Grenadines and by 12.2% in Barbados.
- Montserrat, one of the two destinations reporting international arrivals from the United States for the period January to June, recorded a decline of -7.3%. Montserrat also trailed its 2019 level for this period by -10.6%.

Canada

- Overall, ten of the 20 destinations reporting arrivals from the Canadian market saw an increase in visitor trips, while the other nine experienced declines.
- Four of the six reporting destinations experienced an increase in Canadian visitors for the January to December period. Curaçao, Trinidad & Tobago, Guyana, and Anguilla recorded increases of 20.0%, 8.2%, 7.4%, and 0.1%, respectively. Conversely, arrivals declined in the other two destinations, with the Dominican Republic down by -4.2% and Jamaica down by -17.0%. Of the reporting destinations, Curaçao (89.5%), Guyana (42.8%), Anguilla (23.2%), and the Dominican Republic (7.8%) surpassed their pre-pandemic levels for this period. The other two destinations, Jamaica and Trinidad & Tobago, reported declines of -16.1% and -19.4%, respectively.
- Increases in international arrivals from Canada were recorded in half of the ten destinations reporting for the period January to November. Bermuda recorded the strongest growth at 27.7%, followed by Aruba (13.4%), The Bahamas (8.1%), the Cayman Islands (5.7%), and Belize (1.0%). The other five destinations reported declines in Canadian visitor trips for the period, ranging from -7.3% (Grenada) to -33.2% (Dominica). However, only Aruba and the Cayman Islands recorded higher arrival levels than in the same period in 2019, with increases of 54.1% and 3.4%, respectively. All other destinations experienced declines, ranging from -3.1% (Grenada) to -36.5% (Dominica).

- Both destinations reporting arrivals from Canada for the January to October period saw declines, with arrivals falling by -0.1% in St. Vincent & the Grenadines and by -0.2% in Barbados. However, both destinations surpassed their pre-pandemic arrival levels, with St. Vincent & the Grenadines exceeding its level by 17.8% and Barbados by 2.0%.
- Out of the two destinations reporting tourist visits from Canada for the period January to June, growth was recorded in Montserrat (4.5%). Compared with the same period in 2019, Montserrat, however, received fewer visitors, down -21.1%.

Europe

- International travel from Europe increased in eight of the 20 reporting destinations, while the remaining 11 destinations experienced a decline in European travel.
- International trips from Europe increased in three of the six destinations reporting during the period January to December. Guyana (21.8%), Anguilla (6.0%), and Curaçao (3.7%) reported increases in arrivals from this market. However, declines of -2.4%, -3.5%, and -16.4% were registered in the Dominican Republic, Trinidad & Tobago, and Jamaica, respectively. Of the reporting destinations, Guyana (84.7%), Curaçao (25.9%), and Anguilla (12.7%) exceeded pre-pandemic levels, while the other three destinations registered decreases of -13.2% in Trinidad & Tobago, -19.1% in the Dominican Republic, and -22.5% in Jamaica.
- Of the ten destinations reporting international arrivals from Europe for the period from January to November, Belize (3.8%), Antigua & Barbuda (2.5%), Aruba (1.7%), and Bermuda (0.9%) received more tourists than in the same timeframe in 2024. In the other six destinations, declines ranged from -0.6% in the Cayman Islands to -36.3% in Cuba. All ten destinations recorded declines in European arrivals compared with the same period in 2019, with decreases ranging from -3.4% in Grenada to -69.9% in Cuba.
- Tourist visits from Europe for the period January to October rose by 1.4% in St. Vincent & the Grenadines but contracted in Barbados by -0.7%, the only two destinations reporting data for this period. Compared to pre-pandemic levels, St. Vincent & the Grenadines outperformed the benchmark figure by 12.3%, whereas Barbados saw a decline of -7.6% in arrivals from this market.
- For the January to June period, visitor trips from Europe declined by -11.1% in Montserrat, one of the two destinations reporting. European arrivals to Montserrat also remained below their 2019 midyear level, falling by -0.8%.

Cruise Arrivals

- Cruise visits to the region increased in 14 of the 22 reporting destinations, while the remaining eight registered decreases.
- Cruise visits increased in five of the six destinations reporting for the January to December period, with growth ranging from 2.4% in Cozumel (Mexico) to 13.9% in the British Virgin Islands. However, Jamaica registered a -11.7% decrease in cruise visits during this timeframe. Compared to the same period in 2019, five destinations exceeded their pre-pandemic cruise visit levels, with increases ranging from 3.6% in Cozumel (Mexico) to 151.3% in the Dominican Republic, while Jamaica experienced a falloff of -28.8%.
- Of the eight destinations reporting cruise data for the January to November period, five experienced growth in cruise visits, with increases ranging from 5.9% in Belize to 18.0% in Martinique. In contrast, the Cayman Islands, Saint Lucia, and Bermuda recorded declines of -3.5%, -9.8%, and -12.7%, respectively. Notably, four destinations surpassed their cruise visits for the same period in 2019, with increases ranging 0.3% in Grenada to 93.9% in The Bahamas. However, the remaining four destinations remained below 2019 levels, with declines ranging from -13.8% in Bermuda to -43.8% in the Cayman Islands.
- For the period January to October, cruise visits increased in three of the four reporting destinations, led by Barbados (33.0%). Growth was also recorded in St. Vincent & the Grenadines (7.3%) and the Turks & Caicos Islands (2.7%). However, the US Virgin Islands recorded a decline of -3.9%, in cruise visits during the same period. Compared against the identical period in 2019, the four destinations experienced increases in cruise visits, ranging from 3.3% (St. Vincent & the Grenadines) to 20.3% (the US Virgin Islands).
- A -8.4% decrease in cruise visits was recorded in Antigua & Barbuda, the only destination reporting cruise data for the period January to September. Compared to pre-pandemic arrivals, there was a 1.0% rise in cruise visits for this timeframe.
- Two destinations, Puerto Rico and St. Maarten, reported cruise visits for the January to August period, and while the latter noted an increase of 12.4%, the former registered a decline of -3.2%. The outcomes compared to their 2019 cruise levels showed that St. Maarten noted a falloff of -15.7% while Puerto Rico saw a decrease of -18.6%.
- Trinidad & Tobago reported cruise data for the period January to April and observed a -56.2% decline in cruise visits. Compared to the same period in 2019, Trinidad & Tobago experienced a -26.4% decline in cruise visits.
